Mr. Crossett was Commodore of the Wianno Yacht Club 1916-1924. Later on with station experimentation, 1CCZ was the first person stateside to operate a Yagi beam in 1928. His neighbors thought the antenna was a Ferris wheel, dirigible or a ship.
